A Message About the Evergreen App

In the beginning of the year, two men tapped on the door of Evergreen to tell us that they had tried to download the Evergreen app at the app store and that it was no longer available. It was the first that we had heard of it and we began to investigate immediately. Apparently, our provider web. cemeteries had changed their website and instead of you being able to download our free app from the app store, our new free app must now be downloaded from our website. It is no problem. A pop up menu appears on the website, you download the new free app, and it will again take you directly to the gravesite of your loved one. The app that you may already have on your phone from the app store, will still allow you to take a tour of the cemetery or go to our website, but it will not walk you to the grave of your loved one. It will let you access our burial records but only through the website. Download the new app and enjoy.



Notable Organization - Women's Seamen's Friend Society of Connecticut

"It has been said that the seaman was the first "culture carrier" in the world." These words were written by Captain Jack M. Seymour, U.S. Navy (Retired) in his book Ships, Sailors and Samaritans (p. 38)

And so this newsletter allows us to think of seamen, sailing, and cultures, but more importantly it allows us to reflect on the life of a seaman and the family who he left at home for months at a time.

Movements to aid the temporal and spiritual interests of seamen in various ports did not come about until July of 1776, when the Governor of Connecticut appointed Nathaniel Shaw as an agent to take care of seamen who might be sent to shore.

In 1817, there were approximately 8,500 seamen in New Haven, many who were transients. Some benevolent gentlemen of New Haven organized one of the first seamen's agencies, The Marine Bible Society to distribute bibles to the seamen.

In 1828, the agency became the Seamen's Friend and Marine Bible Society of New Haven and Sunday services were provided. In 1832, one of the earliest hospitals for sick and disabled seamen was opened in New Haven utilizing federal government funds which were collected from the seamen and paid to New Haven Hospital.

The Ladies' Seamen's Friend Society of the City of New Haven (LSFS) was organized in 1859. It was instrumental in the erection of The Sailor's Home in New Haven.

In 1894, the name changed to Connecticut's Woman's Seamen's Friend and services spread to seamen who en-



tered any port in Connecticut.

In 1896, the Society bought a lot in Evergreen Cemetery with space for thirty-six "worthy sailors" whose voyage was over. The granite monument's inscription "Sailors Rest" was added.

There are many "worthy sailors" who are resting here at Evergreen.
